Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions at St. Petersburg College kicks off its 2018-2019 season

with programs that help voters meet the candidates seeking to represent them and to understand the ballot

issues that will affect them. In addition, we will take up some of the most contentious issues in the public policy realm to bring clarity to policymaking decisions. Among these: gun violence and fake news, both of which continue to dominate the political conversation most days. Peace member David Klement is the Executive Director of the Institute.

Florida voters may find more confusion than usual when they get to the bottom of the ballot on Nov. 6. That's because they'll find 27 proposed amendments to the Florida Constitution. But they can't vote on each issue separately. Six of the 13 amendment titles are "bundles" of multiple issues, but voters can only vote for or against the entire bundle.

Confused yet? Don't worry. It will all be made clear at a forum on the amendments sponsored by the Institute titled Constitutional Amendments: Understanding the Bottom of the Ballot. It will be from 6 to 8:30 p.m. Sept. 27 at the Seminole Campus Digitorium, 9200 113th St. N., St. Petersburg. Leading the discussion will be Dr. Frank Alcock, Political Science Professor at New College of Florida. Register at http://solutions.spcollege.edu/.

The emphasis will be on informality and personal conversations at Pizza & Politics, a public gathering of local candidates and the voters to whom they look to get elected. It will be Oct. 4 from 6 to 8 p.m. at the SPC Seminole Campus Conference Center, 9200 113th St. N., St. Petersburg, sponsored by the Institute. The program, which includes serving of pizza

An exploration of the life, lessons, and legacy of iconic children's television host, Fred Rogers..


Mission Trip to Haiti

Exploring: When Helping Hurts & the Peace Haiti Mission

In 2006 churches spent \$1.6 Billion on short term mission projects, and that number has grown



annually. However, as missions expert Miriam Adeney relates in a story by her African Christian friend our effectiveness could use some work:

Elephant and Mouse were best friends. One day Elephant said, "Mouse, let's have a party!" Animals gathered

from far and near. They ate. They drank. They sang. And they danced. And nobody celebrated more and danced harder than Elephant. After the party was over, Elephant exclaimed, "Mouse, did you ever go to a better party?" But Mouse did not answer. "Mouse,

where are you?" Elephant called. He looked around for his friend, and then shrank back in horror. There at Elephant's feet lay Mouse. His little body was ground into the dirt. He had been smashed by the big feet of his exuberant friend, Elephant. "Sometimes, that is what it is like to do mission with you Americans," the African storyteller commented. "It is like dancing with an Elephant."

We will spend five weeks in conversation about how we can find the grace to not dance like elephants as we seek to do Peace mission work. In addition, we will take the opportunity to talk about Haiti, where we plan to send a mission team in November, and learn about the country and the mission where we are going. Resources for the class will be the book *When Helping Hurts* by Steve Corbrett and Brian Fikkert, the book *The Uses of Haiti* by Paul Farmer, and the book *Mountains to Mountains* by Tracy Kidder. This class will be led by Gordy Hyde.

The Story of the Bible

Are you curious about how the different parts of the Bible got written and preserved and copied, accepted and selected and authorized, interpreted and translated and carried to the ends of the earth? Join Mickey Miller and Richard Deibert and Professor Luke Timothy Johnson as they tell the awe-inspiring story of the Christian Bible. This course will be based on 17 selected 25-minute lectures by Professor Johnson, with chapters on the Jewish Scripture; the emergence of Jewish and Christian canons; writing and copying

manuscripts; ancient texts, versions, and variations; the prominence of Latin and the Vulgate; the role of monks and monasteries; Medieval and Renaissance interpretation; the first printed Bible and the Reformation; Englishing the Bible and King James; searching for a universal critical text; the rise of the historical critical method; contemporary Christians and their many Bibles. Professor Johnson will teach the technical basics; Professors Miller and

Deibert will turn those basics into spiritual treasures that nourish your faith. Come meet the Bible you so cherish. Learn its long, beautiful story. And fall more deeply in love with its Lord, Jesus Christ.

Session 1—Peace in the Old and New Testaments, personal, family, society, and national.

Session 2—War and Peace.




Practice for Ringers of Peace (Handbells) has been moved to 6:00 p.m. Wednesdays.
