NEED HELP? CHURCH FAIR HAS GOT IT!

A Health & Wellness Fair designed to answer many questions about health topics is set for Saturday, May 4, from 10 a.m. to noon at Peace Presbyterian Church, 12705 State Road 64, Lakewood Ranch. Admission is free.

"Manatee County has so many programs designed to meet a variety of physical and mental needs that we are hoping to get the message out for those in need; many of them desperate for assistance," says Toni Muirhead, a volunteer with Peace Church.

Blue Butterfly is one such program many folks have not heard about. "Blue Butterfly is a project of Tidewell Hospice's Grief Education and Support Center offering support for children and teens ages 5 to 18 who have experienced the death of a significant person in their lives," explains Timothy Wolfrum, Hospice Communications Director.

"Just as a butterfly emerges from a dark cocoon, a child can find the world a brighter place through the grief process," Wolfrum adds. "As a teen participant explained, 'It's the butterfly effect: We learn to help heal our grief, then we go help someone else with theirs.' "

Need assistance with a senior family member?

Meals on Wheels, known for delivering hot meals to shut-ins, offers Daybreak Adult Day Center five days a week, from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Lakewood Ranch. "Our Adult Center provides much needed respite for caregivers with structured, therapeutic and fun programs for seniors," said Maribeth Phillip, President of Meals on Wheels Plus of Manatee. "These programs are specifically designed to promote the well-being for individuals who have weakened physical or mental capabilities."

"Everyone stays healthier when folks can get out of the house and mix with other people," adds

Jerry Gironda, Meals on Wheels client activities manager. Scholarship assistance may be available for Daybreak clients.

Beth-El Workers—our Team worked a record 916 hours in the final quarter of 2018.

The team members reflect Peace Church. Some work all-year; some, seasonally. Some come every week, some come occasionally. All are welcome, we will find a job for everyone.

We fill bags with groceries every Thursday and have been doing that every week since 2008. Volunteers meet either at the Smoothie King/Trumans on SR 70 near LWR Blvd (Publix Shopping Center) or on the north side of the Ft. Hamer Bridge at the County Park. Many members of the current team have helped from the beginning. Some started helping only a few months ago. Twice a month we go to Beth-El on Monday to rebag 4,000 pounds of beans and rice.

We all find joy in working together to help feed hungry people in the Wimauma community, farmworkers and others.

CROP Walk 2019

Hunger is one of the greatest injustices facing our world. Thirty-five Peace folks, representing 3 generations, joined in The Manatee County CROP Walk on Sunday, Feb. 24, fulfilling a Christian imperative to help feed the hungry. CROP (Christian

Rural Overseas Project), dubbed the "granddaddy of charitable walks," started in 1947 under Church World Service to help feed those in need post-WW II.

Many Manatee County churches gathered at Palmetto United Methodist where our own Pastor Elizabeth led the event's opening prayer. We then walked the 3-mile round trip over the Manatee River via the Green Bridge taking in God's beauty while reflecting on our many blessings.



It was a stellar afternoon in all aspects: weather, fellowship, and impact made. Peace Church has consistently ranked in the top 2 spots for number of walkers and amount donated. Peace raised \$ 2,241 this year (and close to \$ 12,000 over the past 5 years), 25% of which stays locally, where each dollar purchases about 6 pounds of food! Plan to join us next year for another fun-filled and worthwhile few hours on a Sunday afternoon!


If you have attended Peace Church 3 times, you are considered "Peace Family." Every one of you (428 folks) is prayed for, by name, every day of the week.

Five Love Languages:

"Love languages" describe the way we show love and appreciation and feel loved and appreciated. But there may be a disconnect. Depending on our individual personality types, we may experience love






Worship and Music Team Partners


